


Haiku is a non-rhyming form of Japanese poetry developed in the 9th century. Haiku are always written in the present tense and are only three lines long, with a set pattern of syllables: five in the first line, seven in the second line, and five in the third line. Haiku capture the essence of a moment.








Origami Pup

Cut out the square below. Fold as directed to make an origami pup!



- STEP 1 Place the square on a flat surface in a diamond shape with the white side of the paper facing you. Be sure the black triangle is at the bottom point on the back side of your paper.
- Fold in half at the dotted line pulling the top point to the bottom point. STEP 2 The puppy's eyes will be facing you.
- STEP 3 Fold downward at the dotted lines to the right and left of the eyes to create your puppy's ears.
- STEP 4 Fold the bottom point up at the dotted line to complete your pup's face.



Origami Cat

Cut out the square below. Fold as directed to make an origami cat!



- STEP 1 Place the square on a flat surface in a diamond shape with the white side of the paper facing you. Be sure the kitty's face is in the top half on the back side of your paper.
- STEP 2 Fold in half at the dotted line pulling the bottom point to the top point as shown. The kitty's face is still not visible.
- STEP 3 Fold the two bottom points upward on the dotted lines.
- STEP 4 Fold the top triangle down on the dotted line.
- STEP 5 Flip your paper over to reveal your cute kitty.
